Hope and Act

Every vestry meeting begins with a "Question of the Month," which each member takes a turn answering. I love this practice because the answers provide information to help us better understand each other. The most recent question was, "What is your prayer or hope today?" And so, I invite you to consider that question for yourself. Consult your heart. What is its deepest desire, its most tender longing? What is your prayer or hope today? And how might God be calling you to act in response?

As you will read in the pages that follow, the theme for the 2024-2025 Program Year is "Hope and Act," which both builds upon previous years' themes and connects with the language we will be using in worship this month as we focus on environmental stewardship, using the national church's "Season of Creation" materials. Certainty in God's love for us and for all creation means having hope as a person of faith. It is not quietly to wish something were different, but rather actively to join Jesus in making it so. With hope founded on God and with God's support through the changes and chances of life, as we proclaim in Hymn 665 ("All our Hope on God is Founded"), we are positioned to engage as people of faith. To be a Christian is to work toward transforming our communities into places where all people are afforded justice, freedom and peace.

To act on our hopes requires us to be not only focused but also open. We must know what we believe and also see the position of others. We must strive to match the wideness of God's mercy. Phoebe Griswold, wife of one of our former Presiding Bishops, wrote a prayer to help her remember this.

Dearest One, Increase the capacity of my heart. Take its edges and stretch them out To include all in me that I do not love, All in my family that I judge, All in my Church that I fear, And all in the world that doesn't fit.

Your prayers and hopes range from privately personal to widely shared. Some you shelter tenderly in the quiet places of your heart and others you discuss freely. Consider offering all of them to God as questions,

with receptiveness to whatever answers might come. Your actions make a difference. Discernment with the divine will help guide you.

The start of the program year means a return to our three-service schedule, resumption of Christian Formation for all ages, and so much more. Please take the time to read about all that is happening at St. Peter's and beyond and consider getting involved in a new way. Together we will hope and act as people of faith called to make the world a better place for our having been here.

Program Year Theme - "Hope and Act"

St. Peter's 2024-2025 Program Year theme will be "Hope and Act," building on previous years' programs. It also is the theme of our 2024 "Season of Creation" materials. "Season of Creation" is an ecumenical effort to raise awareness of the responsible use of the gifts of creation. The theme for "Seasons of Creation" is "To Hope and Act with Creation."

Beginning September 8 and for the following six weeks, St. Peter's will use a specific, Episcopal guide as one of the resources for designing liturgies and other programs. The theme for "Seasons of Creation" is "To Hope and Act with Creation." Adult Forum, Sunday School and Youth Group topics will be related to creation care. St. Peter's will extend the theme of "Hope and Act" beyond just creation-related matters. As a community infused with the light and love of Christ, we have hope, and we act.

Stewardship: Act Today. Create Tomorrow.

Stewardship is an intentional act of sharing in response to God's abundant love. It addresses both our present needs and our future hopes. It is manifested daily at St. Peter's—in the excellence of our Christian formation program, the hard work of the BB&G4J in enhancing our campus, the transcendent beauty of the weekly musical offerings, the professionalism with which our staff, vestry, clergy, and commissions approach their duties, and the faithful ministry of those who contribute to our many outreach ministries. It is expressed in the simplest of acts—the smile of a child proudly adding an offering to the collection plate, and the kindness and courtesy with which people greet visitors. Stewardship is the essence of how we live in communion with one another.

This year's stewardship campaign theme, "Act Today. Create Tomorrow," recognizes that every act of stewardship is both a response to present needs and an investment in the future. This year, more than most, we are facing both exciting opportunities and short-term challenges. The opportunities are reflected in one word: "growth." We are growing every day and, most importantly, our membership includes increasing numbers of young families. Our future is very bright. The challenges are temporary, but significant: we are transitioning out of a contract for rental of the barn that helped us to maintain and expand our outreach and other activities. We are about to replace that contract with another, but it will take time to reach our former levels of revenue.

We are therefore asking you to do three things. First, since stewardship goes far beyond money, please continue your extraordinary volunteerism, drawing on your individual gifts of time, skill, and passion. Second, please remember that pledging makes it possible for our Finance Commission to forecast available resources and to budget accordingly. A pledge is not a binding commitment, but, regardless of size, it is essential for sound planning. Finally, we ask you to reflect deeply on the amount you will pledge this program year, and to consider whether you can increase your previous generosity as we address our temporary shortfall.

Our stewardship campaign will be launched at all three services on Sunday, September 22, and will conclude on All Saints Day, November 3. You will receive a mailing in mid-September. Please plan to attend our kickoff and join us thereafter as we celebrate with cake. Thank you!

Capital Campaign Update

August 25, 2024

What exciting news we have to share! We are currently on track with the necessary funds to begin the project in January 2025!

Fundraising for the Barn Kitchen Capital Campaign officially began in May 2024 intending to raise \$250,000 based on the project costs quoted by Warfel Construction in July 2023. In July 2024 Warfel reviewed these numbers and confirmed a small increase in the costs for the project (construction and appliances) to \$260,124. To reflect this increase and any contingency costs to complete the project, we have created a new stretch goal of \$300,000.

A second goal was set to encourage 100% parish participation, which would demonstrate our strong commitment to the project as a Third Place, and which would also be viewed favorably in future grant requests.

To date, we have received commitments from just under sixty parishioners/families and two grants that total \$279,600! This reflects \$94,775 applied (cash in hand), the Pew Grant of \$50,000 that can be drawn at any time, and approximately \$50,000 (or more) expected by year's end. We are very grateful that \$200,000 of the total on hand will allow us to begin the project early in January 2025. The remaining commitments will be satisfied through August 2026.

As this project comes closer to reality, we sincerely thank all who have made financial commitments to make this happen. The kitchen has been a dream since the completion of the Barn: a desire to expand our food ministry, providing opportunities for fellowship with parishioners and our neighbors. We will continue to keep you updated as the project progresses. The Sin of White Christian Nationalism

At our recent National Convention of the Episcopal Church in Louisville, Kentucky, the Theology Committee of our House of Bishops issued a report that declared that "Christian Nationalism is a sin that distorts our relationship with God and with one another." It also noted that "Christian Nationalism in the United States has deep roots in white supremacy."

Christian Nationalism in our country today is the erroneous belief that our American nation was established by our founding fathers as a white, puritanical, Christian country; and the accompanying belief that the government should now take active steps in law and regulations to keep it that way.

Christian Nationalists are in fear that our multicultural nation is made "one out of many." Instead, they define "real American citizens" in a racist and religiously bigoted manner. In addition to its undemocratic proclivities, this cultural ideology of American Christian Nationalism damages all our Christian denominations, by giving us a bad name—"hypocrite"—among people of other faiths. It especially does so among secular humanists, who increasingly tar all Christians with the same brush.

On Sundays October 13 and 21 at 10:20 a.m. in the barn, the Rev. Paul Reid will lead a two-part adult formation series on the views, the roots, and very real and present dangers of Christian Nationalism. We will

consider why our bishops consider it to be sinful and will discuss its authoritarian aspects. You are invited to join these forums to express and discuss your own views on this critical issue.
