At the same time, when our local sports announcers began to feel confident that the Phillies were going to clinch the National League East title for the first time since 2011, they designated the entire team as "Player of the Game," noting that a legion of people contributed to the success of the franchise. The scoreboard certainly suggests that some might make more of a difference than others, but they are all essential. They all matter.

When I was a girl my classmates and I were told that we could do everything, and the definite implication was that we should. This was well-meaning encouragement that, indeed, spurred us to achieve certain measures of success. We understood how to accumulate accomplishments and evaluate them in others. We did not necessarily understand the meaning of mattering. There is a difference between knowing you are capable and feeling valued. There is a difference between acknowledging someone and appreciating someone.

There is nothing wrong with measuring, grading, and ranking. Competition can drive us to reach our goals. The key is maintaining balance and being grounded in our understanding of what is valuable. Things like simple kindnesses. The gift of listening and welcoming without condition. And remembering that making an impact happens in all sorts of ways, large and small. Throughout scripture we are reminded that God's love is lavished freely upon us all. There is nothing that anyone must do to gain God's favor and nothing that anyone can do to lose God's favor. We are intimately known and cared for by the divine. "Do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows," we are assured in the gospels. You matter and so does your neighbor.

It is a simple message that can get lost in the noise of the world. Here in Pennsylvania October will include the excitement of post-season play for the Phillies and the buzz of swing state political ads in addition to the usual busyness that fall tends to bring. Here at St. Peter's you will find a place where we are committed to living our baptismal promises to respect the dignity of every human being. A place where we value you, whoever you are. Preschool Update

The Preschool academic year is off to a great start. We are pleased that all our lead teachers have remained on staff, and this will be our third year together as a team. We have two new aides joining the staff, and we are so grateful to have a full staff for the 2024-2025 academic year.

New this year—we are partnering with The Malvern School of Music, which will provide music classes to our 3-year-old and pre-K classes every other week.

In addition, the Preschool Advisory Committee will be reinstated this year, with Nicholas Allen serving as liaison between the Preschool and St. Peter's. We have three alumni/ae parents who have agreed to serve on the committee. The committee will act as advisors to the director in matters of finance, scholarship and Preschool planning.

As always, we hope the parishioners of St. Peter's Church will help spread the word about our little school to the families of young children!


Partnership with Karen Pecora Events

As St. Peter's contract with Robert Ryan Catering ended, Abigail appointed a team to review the experiences of that partnership. She subsequently tasked a committee with investigating marketing and renting opportunities for the barn for a variety of events. They then presented their results to the Vestry. After assessing various options, the Vestry voted to pursue partnership with an event planning professional.

Renting the barn gives St. Peter's the opportunity to share its beautiful resources with the broader community, and revenue from rentals helps the parish achieve a balanced budget. Vestry are pleased to announce the signing of an agreement with Karen Pecora, who will serve as a Consultant Director of Marketing and Events. Adult Formation

10/13 – The Rev. Paul Reid will begin his series on Christian Nationalism - *Part 1: Evangelism and Evangelicalism.* Christian Nationalism has become linked with Evangelicals in the minds of many Americans. And, unfortunately, contemporary Evangelicalism often is seen as representing Christianity to many of the secular American public. Simplistically, Episcopalians and most other Americans identify Evangelicals as people who are "born again" – and most of us know little more. Evangelicalism differs from evangelism as practiced in the Episcopal Church. But not all Evangelical churches espouse Christian Nationalism, and not all are focused on personal salvation to the detriment of the "social gospel" as taught by Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount and elsewhere in Christian Holy Scripture.

10/20 – The Rev. Paul Reid returns with *Part 2: Christian Nationalism*. What is Christian Nationalism? How and why is today's American Christian Nationalism authoritarian and un-democratic, and often exclusively white and Evangelical? Its established-church roots go back to medieval Christianity and, in some cases, even earlier. What are appropriate Episcopal responses to today's Christian Nationalism?

10/27 – St. Peter's clergy and delegates to the Diocesan Convention will discuss Convention events and the experience of serving the Church through participation in this aspect of Diocesan life.
