February Abundance

With fewer days than the other eleven and squarely located in winter, February in the northeastern United States is not generally a month associated with abundance, and yet that is what came to mind during a recent morning run. With no leaves to act as filter, light poured down from a clear blue sky. Over the course of six or so miles my hands never fully defrosted but warmed just enough for me to be comfortable and let my mind do its usual pondering. Looking around I chose consciously to appreciate the frosty landscape. Rather than daydream about spring or even summer days to come, I embraced February.

Easter is late this year, April 20, which means that Lent begins in March, and so the Season after the Epiphany extends through this entire month. To me it feels like a luxurious amount of time to rest in the incarnation and look for Christ made manifest in the world: the ways in which we meet God in others or the ways in which our actions reveal that of the divine within ourselves. And so, we might spend this month preparing for the holy season of Lent by looking for God at work and reflecting on our role in creating communities that resemble the kingdom of God—places where all are welcomed and respected.

History shows that the problems of the world have been complex since the beginning of time. Still, this moment is proving to be so very difficult for so many people— notably, the ones Jesus particularly sees, cares for, and lifts up. The ones Jesus calls us to love. In our baptismal vows we pledge to strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being. These promises help ground and guide me as an individual and also as rector of St. Peter's Church in the Great Valley. In the pages that follow you will find opportunities for worship, formation, outreach, and more, all designed to support and broaden our efforts to live what we believe.

Even in the cold of winter, even midst the problems of the world, the abundant love of God is present. I invite you to join me in seeking it everywhere and bearing it into the places it is most desperately needed.

Special Liturgical Season Services

Candlemas Compline

February 2, 7:30 p.m.

We observed the Presentation of our Lord Jesus Christ in the Temple, also known as Candlemas, with a contemplative service of Compline in the Historic Church. This feast day commemorates the presentation of Jesus and the purification of Mary in the Jerusalem temple forty days after Jesus' birth, in accordance with the requirements of Jesus haw. In the account found in Luke's Gospel, the presentation of Jesus was also the occasion of Jesus meeting with Simeon and Anna. Simeon's prayer of blessing is the basis for the canticle Nunc dimittis. Thank you to the choir, and everyone who supported or made this event possible.

Looking Ahead to Lent

The season of Lent takes its name from an Old English word meaning spring, the time of lengthening days. The natural world journeys from the cold of winter to the freshness of spring as we observe these forty days. This year Easter is April 20 and so Lent begins on March 5 with Ash Wednesday. At St. Peter's you will notice changes seasonal changes toward simplicity and stillness. Like last year, we will maintain silence in the sanctuary as we prepare for and then enjoy the prelude music. We will not sing the Gloria and we will put away the Alleluias. Greens will replace flowers at the front of the worship space and at the end of the service the solemn prayer will replace the blessing. All of this is not about deprivation but rather so that we can focus on the abundant love of God. Our intentional observation of these forty days allows it to be a time of renewal and re-creation.


