Are We There Yet ...?

The liturgical cycle is wonderfully predicable. The year begins four weeks before Christmas with Advent and the journey to the manger. After that we celebrate the revelation of the wise ones throughout the season after the Epiphany by recalling and reflecting on the ways in which the divinity of Jesus is made manifest in the world. Soon we reach Ash Wednesday and the holy season of Lent begins. Forty days later we rejoice in the resurrection and then take weeks and weeks to ponder that incredible story. At Pentecost the Holy Spirit sends us out into the world to proclaim the Good News of Christ. The long green season follows, during which we hear the stories of Jesus' ministry and consider our own. All Saints' arrives in the beginning of November. Just a few weeks later we are back to Advent.

Within that cycle some dates are set. Christmas is December 24, Epiphany is January 6, All Saints' is November 1, but the date of Easter is calculated according to the lunar cycle, using the Golden Number and Sunday Letter, and so it is variable. The earliest possible date for Easter is March 22. The latest is April 25. And so, some years it feels as if Ash Wednesday sneaks up on me almost before my holiday decorations are stored away and other years it feels like I am waiting and waiting for Lent to begin. This year Easter Day is April 20 and I have found myself wondering, are we there yet? Finally we are, after what was for me a surprisingly difficult interlude. And yet I am grateful for the relative leisure we had between busy holiday seasons. It gave me time to prayerfully ponder and do some reordering of my life. As Lent begins I am ready for its holy journey.

Early every morning during this year's long season after the Epiphany I prayed the short service for dawn from *Daily Prayer For All Seasons*, which includes the invitation to mediate on the question "How will I invite God's love to shine through me today?" and the prayer, taken from an Epiphany hymn, "Brightest and best of the stars of the morning, Dawn on our darkness and lend us thine aid; Star of the east, the horizon adorning, Guide where the infant Redeemer is laid." I had never before spent so many weeks with baby Jesus, which took some getting used to and became precious to me. I am always planning for the next thing and moving right along. There was deepening in dwelling. I considered that particular new life that gives us

new life in ways I never had before. I stayed at the cradle and prayed. Then I carried the question with my throughout each day. "How will I invite God's love to shine through me today?" It spurred me to reconnect with dear friends. Encouraged me to extend grace in moments that tried my patience. Kept me hopeful when the brokenness of the world loomed large.

Feeling duly prepared, I now crave the familiar texts, liturgies, and programs of Lent. I am so very glad we are there. In the pages that follow you will find all sorts of opportunities to observe this special season. I invite you to craft your journey with care. Consider what you might try, take on, let go of that will allow you to spend this time intentionally. Reach out to me if you would like to talk about your plans, voice your questions, share your hopes. Do whatever you can to observe this Lent in ways that are meaningful to you. I promise you will be blessed.

Easter Feasts for Darby Mission!

Vicar Doris Rajagopal describes Darby Mission as "a community of families, of good people who want a good life in tough situations," and especially they want life to be better for their children. The mission provides many services, including a safe and loving afterschool program. It has become a tradition at St. Peter's to share Easter's joy by providing all the makings for Easter dinner for 40 families served by the mission. 2025 will be our eighth year.

How will we do this? It will start with 40 colorful shopping bags that will be distributed at church on Sunday, March 23. Attached to each bag will be a very specific shopping list of non-perishable items. It is easy. Take a bag with you, take it to the grocery store, shop for the items (many in the same aisle), and return the bag to church. The cost is about \$23. The Outreach Commission will purchase large roasting chickens and potted daffodils for each family. All bags will need to be returned to church by Sunday, April 6th.

Everything will be delivered to Darby Mission on Good Friday afternoon, April 18. What are Pysanky eggs? They are Ukrainian Easter eggs, created by using traditional designs, drawn with a



wax stylus and then immersed in a series of dyes, from light to dark. Last year we gathered at St. Peter's to create our own, guided by Ukrainian citizen Anastasiia Lunova. She will join us again this year to lead a workshop together with Shannon Almquist and Bonnie Michael. We will learn how to "write" the symbolic forms that have graced these beautiful eggs for centuries; the designs on these harbingers of Easter and spring are "written" because their name derives from pysaty, which means "to write." If you can join in, bring some



2026 Choir Residency



The choirs of St. Peter's will be engaged in singing a week-long choral residency in July 2026 at Norwich Cathedral, Norfolk, England. Parishioners and friends are invited to join us. Past residencies have been deeply rewarding experiences of intensive music-making and historical and spiritual enrichment.

Norwich Cathedral is a 900-year-old structure of Norman style architecture, boasting the second-tallest spire in England at 315 ft. and the cathedral cloisters are the second

largest in England. With ancient architecture on beautiful grounds, set in a medieval city, this will be a journey back in time. Day trips to Cambridge, other cathedrals, market days, and royal residence tours will be included.

Speak to Steven Patchel or any choir member if you are interested in joining in this choral pilgrimage. Deposits of \$500 will be required by July 2025 in order to hold your place in the trip, with the balance due in 2026. The final cost is based on the number of attendees.
