Resurrection Life

Blessed be the longing that brought you here

And quickens your soul with wonder.

May you have the courage to listen to the voice of desire That disturbs you when you have settled for something safe.

May you have the wisdom to enter generously into your own unease To discover the new direction your longing wants you to take.

These opening lines to one of the poetic blessings in John O'Donohue's beautiful volume *To Bless the Space Between Us: A Book of Blessings* put me in mind of the resurrection. Many years ago, in her Easter message to the Diocese of Washington, D.C., Bishop Mariann Budde talked about the difficult process of letting go into new life. Of releasing the past in order to move toward the future. She wrote, "Resurrection comes as an invitation, sometimes gently, as the changing of the wind from winter to spring, and sometimes suddenly, as an opportunity that falls unexpectedly on your path. The initial experience may feel at first like a second death, but it isn't death. It's life."

I wonder if the caterpillar ever contemplates remaining inside the safety of their cocoon. I wonder if the dogwood ever tries to hold its flowers in bud rather than allow them to unfurl, exposing tender petals to the elements. Surely a parent knows the impulse to keep a child close when they yearn to go off and explore the world. Maybe you have resisted change even when it is clear that what once was must give way to what will be.

The women who went to the tomb early in the morning were perplexed when Jesus' body was missing. They became terrified at the appearance of two men in dazzling clothes who remind them of what Jesus had said. As the news spreads the disciples experience a range of emotions, and they need time to comprehend what

has happened. Jesus' friends did not want him to die and also they do not understand why he is no longer dead. They were captivated by his ministry and also not entirely sure how to carry it on without him.

This month we continue our Lenten journey, travel through the terrible beauty of Holy Week, and enter into the new life of Easter. The story is hard to believe and yet we do. We believe in a God who loves us entirely. A God who faced down and overcame death so that we might know the fullness of life. Pay attention to the longings of your heart and wonder about the new directions God is inviting you toward this season. In the pages that follow you will find examples of how the people of St. Peter's live as resurrection people. People who embrace new life by doing what we can to bring the justice, peace, and love of God's kingdom to this earthly realm. Thank you for all that you do, and prayers as you discern and accept what O'Donohue calls your "divine urgency."

Lenten and Holy Week Choral Music

Palm Sunday

St. Peter's choirs will offer an *Evensong and Concert* on the evening of Palm Sunday, April 13, at 4 p.m. in the barn. A traditional choral Evensong will usher us into Holy Week, followed by a concert featuring the *Sunrise Mass* of Norwegian composer Ola Gjeilo (pronounced OH-la YAY-loh) with choir and string orchestra.

The work consists of a complete setting of the Latin mass, with curious titles such as "The Spheres" and "The City" that overlay a concept of "human development . . . a spiritual journey, or the creative process itself" on the sacred texts. The 35-minute *Mass* is inspired by contemporary film music and includes ethereal vocal effects as well as dramatic and soothing harmonic progressions. Please join us for this inspiring event.

Will You Keep Watch?

Maundy Thursday, April 17, 9 p.m. - Good Friday, April 18, noon

The disciples slept while Jesus prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane. Their stomachs were full from the Passover meal. Their minds were even fuller remembering what had happened. Jesus had washed their feet. He had given new meaning to the bread and wine they shared. He had spoken of betrayal. He was clearly troubled. Now he wanted them to watch and pray. It is small wonder they succumbed to sleep.

Watch will be kept over the altar of repose in the Historic Church throughout the night of Maundy Thursday (beginning at 9 p.m.) and until noon on Good Friday. Parishioners are invited to be present in the Historic Church for an hour of their choosing to keep watch before the stripped altar. It is a time of profound quiet. In the

busyness of Holy Week this can be a time to be at peace or to be troubled, to wonder, to perhaps like the disciples succumb to sleepiness, to pray, to respond to stirrings of the Spirit. Will you keep watch?

Spend one hour this night at St. Peter's. Deacon Jeff will be in the church throughout the entire night for your safety. New Chairs in the Barn!

There are approximately 320 chairs in the barn, many only making appearances at Easter and Christmas. The rest of the time they have been stored in a corner of the kitchen. With the kitchen remodeling, storage has become more limited. The Vestry has realized that this is an opportunity to replace a number of these chairs, some of which have been damaged, with chairs that will be more versatile as well as more easily moved and stored.

Good news—another parish in the diocese will take 100 chairs, so they will be going to a good home. All the chairs will be in the barn for Easter, after which the plaques will be removed from the extra chairs. The Chair Committee has a list of all the plaques on the backs of the chairs, and the ones removed (primarily duplicates and names no longer associated with active parish members) will be mounted on a wall display.

Between Easter and Christmas additional chairs will not be needed for worship, though should a need arise, we can move folding chairs from the Historic Church. A subgroup of the Chair Committee is looking at options for replacement chairs that will work for both additional seating for worship as well as events like weddings and meals, thus expanding the possibilities for serving the community with our new kitchen. These options will be assessed from a financial perspective as well. Please reach out to the Chair Committee with any questions, and we welcome suggestions and ideas.


