What Are You Doing for Easter?

As Lent was drawing to a close last month, I was part of a conversation among some acquaintances who were discussing their Easter plans. They talked about visiting family and details of the meals they anticipated. Then someone said, somewhat sheepishly, "I will probably go to church again for the first time since Christmas." These people are not aware that I am a priest and so, not knowing what to say, I said nothing and went on my way to Holy Week services a little embarrassed that I could not come up with some sort of inviting words to offer. What I could not quite figure out how to articulate was that while it is nice, even stirringly beautiful, to go to church on Christmas and Easter, it is all that happens on the other 51 or so Sundays of the year that really matters. Church is not a chore, it is a delight. I know that busy spring schedules will make attendance difficult even for regular churchgoers and scores of others will not give it much thought again until December. As we move into Eastertide, and journey with the disciples as they try to make sense of the resurrection, it is a good time to remind yourself of why *you* think it matters.

Each year there is a particular pattern to the lectionary during the fifty days of Easter. First, Jesus's fearful friends are locked away when he appears with a message of peace and forgiveness. Famously, Thomas, who was not in the room, demands proof. The next week we hear stories of scales falling from eyes and Jesus being recognized in abundance. On the Fourth Sunday of Easter we observe Good Shepherd Sunday and remember that we can rely on Jesus' steadfast care. As the season goes on we hear more stories that ground us in the fundamental truths of our savior who is the way, the truth, and the life and who professes his love for us and calls us to love others. While the Sunday of the Resurrection is one day, Easter lasts far longer, giving us time to consider the mystery and also preparing us for the Day of Pentecost when the Spirit sends us into the world to carry on Jesus' ministry.

To me it matters because in a life full of changes and a world full of troubles the reliable care of Jesus tells me that all will be well. Not that everything will be easy or comfortable, but that I will find the equilibrium that I need and will be able to do my part to make a difference. And in Christian community we support one another in exploring what it means to follow Jesus and in strengthening our commitment to Christ. Most compellingly, we all need a place where people are trying their best to model the inclusive care of God.

In the pages that follow you will find the reasons that St. Peter's matters to you. Maybe the excellence of our music program deepens your experience of worship. Perhaps you are drawn in by outreach opportunities. It might be that you love to learn and discuss books or movies or the topics offered in Christian Formation. However you choose to participate, thank you for being a part of the community. However often you attend—frequently or infrequently—you are always welcome.

May 17 and 18, 4 p.m.


